

Ice Fishing Safety Checklist BY TIM ALLARD

Hard-water fishing is not without its risks. Be prepared with the necessary safety items should trouble arise. The following is a sampling of recommended ice-fishing safety gear to carry.

 ☐ Ice drill and ruler: use to bore holes and measure ice thickness; ☐ Chisel: punch the ice in front of you with this tool as you walk to test for thin ice; ☐ Ice picks: for gripping the ice to pull yourself out; 	☐ Flashlight or headlamp: to avoid hazards and maintain a safe walking path; ☐ Tool kit: for on-ice repairs of snow- machines, ATVs, augers, shelters, etc; ☐ Sunglasses: eye pro- tection from harmful	at the beginning and end of a season when conditions can change constantly.
