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MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

My name is Greg Balch and for those who have never met me, I am an angler, hunter, and a professional trapper. I was elected to the position of Chair of Zone J this past March. I also travel and teach Wildlife Ecology and Canadian History with a large display of wildlife mounts doing a program that I initially created in 1993 now entitled "Community Wildlife Management Workshops". I don't know everything, and I never will. I learn on a daily basis, and

I don't know everything, and I never will. I learn on a daily basis, and I will continue to learn every day of my life. I also learn from those I see during my presentations. In 2020 I spoke to a group where I repeated a myth created by Walt Disney in the 1960's about Lemmings killing themselves. A Zone J member was in the audience emailed me after the presentation explaining my mistake and provided a link to a research paper on Lemmings that explained they have mass drowning events. Lemmings must find new sources of food as their population grows and they must swim across large bodies of water. Not all of them make it across. Other Animals that can experience mass drowning events are Bison, Caribou and Wildebeest to name a few. Thank you to that member for the correct information!

Conservation is the effort by conservationists to maintain the entire resource in a healthy state.

I feel we need to improve the image that anglers and hunters as Conservationists. Each year prior to the pandemic and again soon, I have travelled to fall fairs with my display. At these fairs and sometimes at other speaking engagements such as schools, plowing matches, Scout, and Guide groups I get challenged by people who claim that the only thing we want to conserve are the animals we pursue. They couldn't be more wrong! Conservation is the effort by conservationists to maintain the entire resource in a healthy state. David Wills stated in his paper, The

Politics of Advocacy, "that for an animal rightist, stopping all use of animals is an intellectual exercise, but for anglers, hunters and trappers, maintaining healthy populations of wildlife is our whole life". We have cities that have large populations, and those people are far removed from a land-based lifestyle. They also have the habit of getting only one side of the story and don't hear the entire debate. American Economist Dr Thomas Sowell states that "the most important knowledge is the knowledge of one's own ignorance". As an example, Dr Sowell points out an experiment designed by two comedians in which a woman walks around a state fair with a petition asking, "the government to ban Dihydrogen Monoxide which she said was in our urine, tears, sweat, lakes, rivers and streams". She collected thousands of signatures from people who had no idea what Dihydrogen Monoxide was! They just signed the petition.



We need to be better educated and we need to address the public in an intelligent way that shows that we are the true stewards of the resource.

If you haven't caught on yet, Dihydrogen Monoxide is just a fancy name for water, H2O. In the tropical areas of our planet water vapor can be as much as 50,000 parts per million, or 5% of our atmosphere and water vapor is the largest greenhouse gas we have, not CO2.

We need to be better educated and we need to address the public in an intelligent way that shows that we are the true stewards of the resource. I'm hoping we can start right here.

GRANT PRESENTATION TO LONG POINT WATERFOWLERS ASSOCIATION



Long Point Waterfowlers Association receives a \$3000 Grant Cheque from OFAH Zone J.

Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) Zone J Executive presented a \$3000 grant to Long Point Waterfowlers Association. LPWA is a long-standing partner and affiliated club within OFAH Zone J. These funds will help with the Long Point Crown Marsh enhancements that support the sustainable activities associated with and including hunting opportunities.

Receiving the cheque are LPWA President, John Foster, and grandson, Kash Proper.

Then LPWA is active in promoting hunting opportunities for youth and new hunters of all ages.

One of the many benefits to being a Club Member of Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters Zone J is the ability to apply for grant funding from the OFAH. Please contact secretaryzonej@gmail.com to request an application.

Every year the crown marsh requires some maintenance for many reasons, such as the preservation of the Hemi-Marsh. 50% water 50% vegetation, that creates the best environment for the vast amount of wildlife that calls the marsh home. Each year the LPWA contracts the appropriate equipment the to clear the weeds from the channels and ponds allowing freshwater flow throughout the marsh. The channels are used by a diversified group of people from hunters and fishermen to education institutions such as universities, as well as providing access in an emergency to First Responders. The LPWA also maintains approximately 40 blinds and shooting points in the crown marsh and the DUC Sinclair property. The LPWA is a 100% volunteer organization and our ability to pay for the cost of the maintenance depends on the support of our partners such as The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters. In addition to the marsh maintenance, the LPWA is active in promoting hunting opportunities for youth and new hunters of all ages. The waterfowl unit in long point is a great place for beginners to get their introduction to waterfowl hunting. It's a very well-organized and safe place to get your feet wet. Long point bay is a world-class waterfowl hunting destination. Much of the area is privately owned and managed by hunt clubs and their contribution and



commitment to conservation keeps the entire area a wild natural place where members and the public can continue to enjoy the bounty of the 1750 acres of Crown Land located in the heart of the bay. Along with the maintenance that allows the public access to the marsh the LPWA also maintains wheelchair-accessible blinds when water levels allow, these blinds can be reserved with our reservation system and assistance is available with some pre-planning. Throughout the year you will find different universities doing studies and research throughout the marsh under permits issued by the MNR all accessed by the channels maintained yearly by the LPWA.



FUN FACT:



Canadian firearms owners are some of the most highly trained in terms of safety and storage in the entire world. The following method is used to reinforce safe gun handling. ACTS & PROVE, is an acronym used by all licensed gun users to ensure their firearm is safe and prove it is unloaded. ACTS & PROVE stands for: (Assume every firearm is loaded. Control the

muzzle direction at all times. <u>Trigger</u> finger must be kept off the trigger and out of the trigger guard. <u>See</u> that the forearm is unloaded-Prove it safe. <u>PROVE-Point</u> the firearm in the safest direction. <u>Remove all the cartridges</u>. <u>Observe the chamber</u>. <u>Verify the feeding path</u>. Examine the bore.)

RECIPE CORNER: EASY WALLEYE/PICKEREL FISH CAKES

Are you looking for an alternative way to enjoy your catch this summer? Here is a delicious walleye recipe!



- Shred 3 4 potatoes
- 2. After shredding, use a clean cloth to squeeze the liquid out of the potatoes as much as you can.
- 3. You will need 4 6 walleye fillets
- 4. Rince the fillets
- 5. Heat oil in the skillet under medium heat
- 6. Place the clean fillets into the skillet
- 7. Add about 1/3 cup of water into the skillet, this will help cook the fish thoroughly
- 8. Cover and cook for about 5 6 minutes
- 9. If it is white, it is cooked.
- 10. Drain the water
- 11. Let it cool down before putting it into the shredded potatoes
- 12. Chop the fish up, the shredded the better.
- 13. Mix together with the potatoes
- 14. Add 1/4 cup of flour
- 15. Add pepper and salt (to taste)
- 16. Add chopped onions (to taste)
- 17. Add one egg and mix everything together
- 18. In a clean frying pan, add oil to a medium heated frying pan
- 19. Shape the mixture into small balls about the size of a golf ball, then flatten and place into the hot oil carefully.
- 20. When both sides are golden and done, place on a paper towel to drain and cool.
