There were glossier magazines, but Ontario Out of Doors was jammed packed with articles, studies, government agendas, conservation laws and regulations, latest fishing techniques, tips and pictures of real people catching real fish. Looking back, I think I didn't pick this magazine; it chose me. I would read and re-read that thing all summer and when done, it went on the shelf with the many others from years gone by. Or it was sent to purgatory as outhouse reading material.

When I had children, I taught them to fish, like my father before me. I smile now when I think of the small roll, I play in the OFAH Zone J as Treasurer/Secretary. I really wouldn't have it any other way. I'm not an arm's length kind of guy, I love people, getting to know them, their stories, it's the best thing about this role.

I'm under no illusions here, you're not my family, not my closest friends but we are not strangers either. We have something unique in common, a love for the outdoors, family, and this great province of Ontario. Whether it be hunting, fishing, trapping or just walking the dog in the woods. So, I feel as if I am very comfortable here amongst like-minded people.

FUN FACT: The moose aerial inventory survey is done for this year. The survey staff flew over 826 hours this winter to count moose. Moose aerial inventory surveys were completed in wildlife management units (WMUs) in all three regions:



- Northeast: WMUs 23, 24, 26, 27, 30, 36, 37, 40, 42
- Northwest: WMUs 11A, 11B, 11C, 12A, 12B, 17, 18A, 18B
- Southern: WMU 59

GOVERNMENT WITHDRAWS TWO CONTROVERSIAL GUN LAW CHANGES

Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) said the withdrawal acknowledged the widespread opposition from Canadians to the amendments and the need for consultation with gun owners.

"We will continue to urge the government to focus their efforts where they will be most effective at reducing crime – by keeping guns out of the hands of people who shouldn't have them, giving police forces the funding, tools and training needed to address gun smuggling and gang violence, and

Ruffed grouse is by far the most popular small game species in Ontario. A 2020 survey of Ontario small game hunters found that most (63%) preferred ruffed grouse and grouse in general (77%) to all other small game species. Ruffed grouse are an important component of Ontario's biodiversity, as well as generating well over one hundred million dollars annually in hunting-related expenditures.

RECIPE CORNER:

This is a recipe from the meateater.com. While travelling in Montana, Steve Rinella's cameraman/director came up with the meal after surveying the available ingredients. Steve called the result, "turkey magic" and now shares the recipe to all turkey fanatics and has sworn off all other turkey recipes for this one.

INGEDIENTS:

- 1 wild turkey breast half, boneless and skinless
- Kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 eggs beaten with a little water
- 2 cups panko breadcrumbs
- Vegetable oil
- 1 lemon, cut into wedges

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Cut the turkey breast half crosswise into 6 pieces, roughly 4-5 ounces each.
- 2. One at a time, place the pieces between two layers of plastic wrap.
- 3. Using a rock, hammer, meat mallet, or any other heavy solid object, pound the breast pieces until they are about 1/3 inch thick.
- 4. Season the turkey breast slices with salt and pepper.
- 5. Put the flour, beaten egg mixture, and breadcrumbs in separate plates or baking dishes.
- 6. Dredge the turkey pieces in the flour, then dip them in the egg, and finally coat in the breadcrumbs.
- 7. Meanwhile, heat 1/3-inch oil in a heavy-bottomed pot or Dutch oven over high heat.
- 8. Fry the schnitzel till golden brown on one side, turn, and brown the other side until cooked all the way through.
- 9. Drain on a plate lined with paper towels. Season with salt.
- 10. If eating by the campfire, squeeze a lemon wedge over the meat, then just eat it with your hands. If you're in a more civilized setting, serve with a knife and fork.



ZONE J QUIZ ANSWERS



- 1. There are two bear species in Ontario, the black bear and polar bear.
- 2. The main thing to ID is the tail. Splake exhibit a slight forking of the tail, although not as extreme as the lake trout. Brook Trout have a very "square" tail. See the following picture:

- 3. No fishing is permitted in Algonquin Park from December to later April and serves as a fish sanctuary. There are a lot of other things to do in the famous provincial park other than fishing such as cross-country skiing, snow shoeing, skating, hiking and just enjoying the beauty of the great outdoors in the winter. But no fishing.
- 4. Ontario's only marsupial is an opossum.
- 5. Canada geese cannot fly year-round. They molt all their flight feathers at once and cannot fly for several weeks afterwards. Molting occurs while they are nesting and raising their young.
- 6. Deer have excellent day and night vision but have limited ability to see colour including hunter orange.
- 7. A skunk can spray up to 3 metres or 10 feet, but the smell can carry for many kilometres.
- 8. During the spring turkey hunt, you can harvest a bearded turkey.
- 9. Women are the fastest growing demographic in the fishing and hunting industry. Surpassing men and young boys by a very large margin. Source: Alyssa Lloyd, 2019
