

MOURNING DOVE RESEARCH – GRANT RECIPIENT

OFAH member Emad Hazboun, a longtime Hunter Education Instructor, is completing his Master of Science at Western University with a focus on Mourning Doves. His research will investigate the approximate mourning dove natal origin (e.i, breeding grounds) by using the measurements of natural stable isotope markers in the feathers. The study is a two-part process; one is to create a Mourning Dovespecific feather hydrogen isotope calibrated "isoscape" to be used to assign individuals to molt origin based on feather isotope analyses. The second part is to use this calibrated isoscape to assign hunted birds to origins in North America and so provide the first unbiased estimate of production regions supporting the fall harvest. This study is the first of its type and approach in Canada, if not in North America. It's a continent-wide 2-year program and will augment uncovering the breeding grounds for mourning doves at a higher geographic resolution.



Trapping sites were carefully selected, baited with sunflower seeds, and monitored for activities in Middlesex County. In early July, captured mourning doves, will be feather sampled, blood sampled, banded, then released. The blood sampling of mourning doves will be used for future work on avian influenza. This will assist in future management plans and ensure a healthy population for future fall harvest. Emad was successful in receiving Grant funding from Zone J to support his research. Stay tuned to Zone J as we will keep you informed about this important research on Mourning Doves.



PHEASANT HUNT RETURNING TO CONESTOGO

A 45-year-old pheasant hunt that was cancelled in 2021 <u>will</u> return to Conestogo Lake Conservation Area (CLCA) this fall.

The hunt is a three-year pilot program. Made possible by the efforts of a dedicated group of pheasant hunting enthusiasts, with support from the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH).

The hunt was revived after a small group of hunters met with the Grand River Conservation Authority (GRCA) board of directors in January 2022 to present a proposal to develop a self-funded, volunteer-run, pheasant program in Area 3 of the CLCA. The result was the pilot project and the formation of the Conestogo Pheasant Club (CPC). The CPC

The CPC is a volunteer, not-for-profit, OFAH affiliate club. Its role is to arrange hunt logistics. Including procurement of pheasants, build a social media presence, and manage membership applications and payments. The CPC hopes to have 80 members in its first year and 100 in the subsequent two. Only OFAH members can join the CPC, due to the federation's membership insurance.

Club president Mario Coniglio said the GRCA sold 125 permits in the year prior to the hunt's cancellation. But noted that the CPC executive thought it would be prudent to scale back membership to a manageable size for their inaugural season. This is also appropriate since the hunt is now confined to a smaller portion of the former hunt area.

CPC membership applications, which cost \$280 for the season, will be available on June 1 and sold on a first-come-first-served basis. For more information, join the Conestogo Pheasant Club Facebook group or visit<u>www.conestogopheasantclub.ca.</u>

The hunt will run from Sept. 25 to Nov. 27. And 1,000 pheasants will be released. This year, only season permit holders will be permitted to hunt. But the CPC is examining the feasibility of daily permits for subsequent years.

"The CPC's goal is to provide an accessible, high quality, and inclusive hunting experience to pheasant hunting enthusiasts in southern Ontario," said Coniglio.

Did you know that invasive species such as the sea lamprey, zebra mussels, round goby, among others in the Great Lakes can be transported from lake to lake via your boat if you do not rinse it off and clean out all the live wells. Even if they appear to be fish free. Do your part and reduce the incidence of transporting invasive species to another body of water by cleaning and draining your boat before transporting. This includes cleaning the propellor, anchor, dock line, live wells, trailer, hull, rollers, bunk, axle, propeller, motor and bilge.
